
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1 General information








Ethnicity and Religion



A third of young people **did not** identify **Jersey** as their ethnic background.

35% of young people reported having a religion.



2 Home and belongings



Money

1 in 10 said their family isn't well off.

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Home



70% had a dedicated space at home to themselves to do school work.

63% of year 6 children owned a smartphone.



Rising to **100%** of year 12.

Belongings

- Children were asked how many of these 10 things they had:
 - a smart phone
- \mathbf{A} a garden or nearby park to play in
 - the right kind of clothes to fit in with peers
- m trips out with family at least once a month
- pocket money to spend on yourself each week
- the right kind of shoes / trainers to fit in with peers
- smart TV / iPad or equivalent device
- a car available to the family when needed
- ----- one holiday or more away each year
 - money that you can save each month.

Out of 100 children in Jersey

3 Health and diet



74% described their health as good or very good.

15% said they had a disability or long-term illness.

Sleep

58% or year 4s said they got **8 hours or more** sleep the previous night ...



...but **61%** of year 6s also got 8 hours or more sleep.



1 in 4 consumed at least 5 portions of fruit or vegetables the previous day.



The amount of young people who ate 5 portions of fruit and vegetables went down as children got older from:



32% in Year 4 **10%** in Year 12.

Dental Hygiene

86% brushed their teeth at least twice the previous day.

85%

85% have visited the dentist within the last year

... up from **80%** in 2021.



Girls were more likely to eat fresh fruit, salads or vegetables 4 or more days a week.

4 Leisure time and sport

Leisure time

90% reported enjoying spending time with their parents or carers.



20% of year 10s stayed outside their home past 10pm with no adult present at least weekly.

Physical activity

22% of young people did the NHS recommended level of physical activity.

79% of Year 10 girls and **60%** of Year 10 boys want to continue full-time education.

34% of year 12 students wanted to go to university off-island and **not** return.




Boys in years 10 and 12 — more interested in Sport, leisure and culture, finance, and engineering.

Use of social media



59%

59% of children and young people had a social media account in their own name.

1 in 6 year 4s had a social media account in their own name.

Use of chatrooms

Half (53%) of year 4s were using internet chatrooms or social networking sites "at least sometimes"


This goes right up to (97%) for year 12s.



Girls (56%) are more likely to use them everyday than boys **(51%)**.

Online behaviour

37% of young people had sent messages to a stranger online.

7% of year 6s had changed or removed settings on social media to gain more followers.

9% of year 6s had lied to their parents or carers about who they had spoken to online.



7 Self-esteem and wellbeing

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Boys were happier than girls in all age groups.



Self-esteem

26% of years 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12 had low or medium-low self esteem.

The number of young people worrying 'often' or 'every day' about the way they look increases with year group.

23% of young people get support said 'speaking to a professional' would help their mental health.



8 Bullying



Bullying at school



22% of young people reported having been bullied in the last 12 months.

1 in 10 year 4 children said they often or very often felt worried to go to school because of bullying.



Girls were more worried about going to school because of bullying than boys.

Does school take it seriously?

Nearly **6 in 10** year 6 children believed their school always took bullying seriously.




This decreased for years 8, 10 and 12 children.



Being a bully

1 in 5 year 4s were involved in bullying using their mobile phones, tablets, online games or social media, "a few times", "often" or "very often" in the last school term.



1 in 5 year 6s were involved in physical bullying "a few times", "often" or "very often" in the last school term.



9 Gender stereotypes



Attitudes to gender stereotypes

58% of **girls** strongly agree that it's fine for boys to play with dolls.

63% of **girls** strongly agree that it's fine for girls to play with trucks.



20% of **boys** strongly agree that it's fine for boys to play with dolls.

24% of **boys** strongly agree that it's fine for girls to play with trucks.

Gender roles

91% agree that parents should have equal responsibility for raising children.

10 Police and crime



Police

74% of young people agreed that the police can be relied upon.

Crime

1 in 13 said they were a victim of crime in the last year, with St Helier being the most likely place for the crime to happen.



Telling someone about a crime

Half of children and young people who were a victim of a crime **did not tell an adult**.
